Avoid an energy spike at Thanksgiving

It's not unusual for home energy bills to spike around the holidays. Don't let it happen this Thanksgiving.

Get the right size turkey. Buy a bird that's just big enough to feed your family. Smaller turkeys cook quicker—which saves energy.

Don't preheat your oven. It's not necessary for a turkey, which is going to roast for several hours.

■ Make the dressing stovetop. Roasting a stuffed turkey takes longer.

■ If you're baking side dishes, put them all in the oven at the same time—if their baking temperatures are similar.

■ Turn down the temperature on your home's thermostat by a few degrees once you start cooking. You'll be heating up the kitchen as you use the oven and stovetop, your home will be warmer than usual.

Your Safety Matters Winterize your home before the bitter chill

The best time of the year to start winterizing your home is before the temperatures start to drop and snow is already on the ground. If you're reading this and haven't already made those small changes, consider this your nudge to get started.

Preparing your home for cold temperatures doesn't have to be difficult or expensive. Understanding how to winterize your home can keep you safe and help keep your energy bills lower.

Protecting pipes

If a pipe does burst in your home, avoid electrocution by calling Shelby Energy right away if you do not have access to safely turn off the electricity before going down into a basement or before touching any plugged-in appliances.

Here's how you can protect your pipes this winter:

Turn off outdoor faucets and have sprinkler systems blown out by a professional.

Drain outdoor hoses.

Remove and drain window A/C units.

■ Insulate pipes in exposed or unheated areas.

■ Keep your thermostat above 55 degrees.

• On especially cold days, open cabinets to let warm air reach sink pipes.

Roof damage

To avoid rooftop water damage from clogged gutters, clean your gutters after the last leaf of the season falls. This will keep ice and water from building up, which could possibly cause leaking on your roof.

Before a storm hits, have a professional check the trees around your home. Dead or dying limbs on your tree will most likely fall during the first big storm, causing damage to not only your home but possibly your neighbor's homes as well.

Winter appliances

When preparing for winter weather, remember to check on winter appliances that have been stored away. Look over appliances like snow blowers and generators to be sure the wiring isn't cracked and that all other parts are in safe working order.

Storm preparation

Being prepared for the worst is no small feat. You should assemble a storm kit that will get you through at least three days without leaving the house. Here are some items we recommend putting in your kit:

Semi- or non-perishable food items.

Enough water for one gallon per person per day.

Lamps and flashlights; don't forget the batteries. Avoid using candles. They could be a fire hazard.

- A first aid kit stocked with essentials.
- Battery-operated radio.
- Basic tools.

Alternative clean heat source, like a fireplace or indoor-rated propane heater. Be extremely careful about using generators, kerosene or other heaters that create deadly carbon monoxide.

Start preparing your home now before the chill of winter really sets in.

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2019 Honor Flight


Sponsored by Shelby Energy and Kentucky's Touchstone Energy Cooperatives
